VITA Tax Service 2023 Tax Season

VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) volunteers will once again be at the library to complete tax forms for senior citizens and qualified tax payers earning less than \$75,000 on Mondays, Tuesdays, & Thursdays from February 6—April 13. This service is free but by appointment only. NO walk-ins will be taken.

Appointments will be taken starting January 9. Interested residents should call the library front desk at 724-695-8150 option 1 to schedule an appointment. Please call early to be assured of obtaining an appointment.

The library will have standard Federal tax forms and instructions available estimated January 31. Other Federal tax forms may be obtained from the IRS website ([irs.gov](https://www.irs.gov)) or by calling 1-800-829-3676.

State tax forms are no longer being distributed to libraries. They can be obtained from the PA Department of Revenue at www.revenue.pa.gov/PIT or by calling 1-888-PATAXES or 1-717-787-8201.

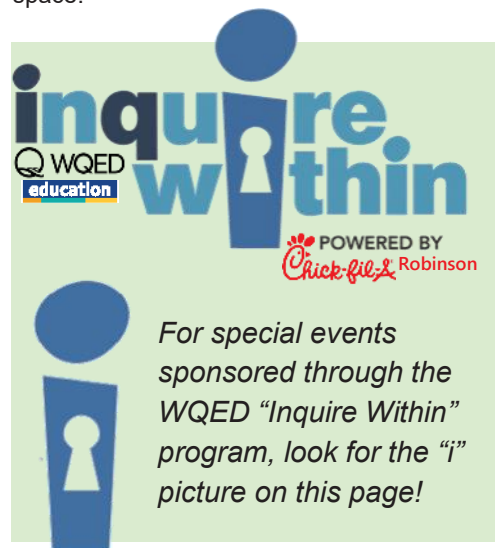
